

SHARING THE ROAD:

Why Driver's Licenses for All Makes Sense

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Expanding access to driver's licenses is not new



Until 2008, all Michiganders—including undocumented immigrants and those who cannot prove their legal presence—had the ability to obtain a driver's license after passing a driver's test and meeting other requirements. The law changed after Attorney

General Mike Cox issued an opinion on the issue in 2007 and the Legislature took action to codify this opinion into law.

Driver's license legislation has been introduced



The Drive SAFE (Safety, Access, Freedom and the Economy) bills were introduced in May 2021 by Reps. Padma Kuppa (D-Troy) and Rachel Hood (D-Grand Rapids).
The bills are HB 4835 and HB4836.

These bills would bring Michigan law up to speed with that of 16 other states that allow residents who meet all other requirements to obtain a driver's license: CA, CO, CT, DE, HI, IL, MD, NV, NM, NY, NJ, OR, UT, VA, VT, WA, plus Puerto Rico and District of Columbia


MORE INSURED DRIVERS AND LOWER AUTO INSURANCE



20,000 more Michigan drivers would be insured and have passed driver's tests. To register a passenger vehicle in Michigan, one must have auto insurance. Roads are safer and accidents are resolved more smoothly when more drivers have passed a standardized driving test and are insured.

Across the country, states that allow undocumented immigrants to apply for driver's licenses see lower annual premiums; doing so in Michigan would save Michiganders about \$20 a year. Although this is a modest decrease, that is enough to pay for a car wash in the thick of Michigan winter!
