Jack Gordon is host of the radio show "Interfaith-ish" on WOWD 94.3FM Takoma Radio in Takoma Park, Maryland (episodes can also be found on Apple Podcasts). His show, 'Interfaith-Ish,' is described as "conversations about what we believe, why we believe, and how we navigate the common ground and

differences between our traditions." He has worked as a professional documentary filmmaker for nearly 20 years, and recently directed the short film 'To Bigotry No Sanction', commissioned by George Washington University. Jack has been active in the DC area interfaith scene since 2010, serving on the board of the Interfaith Council of Metropolitan Washington and spearheading the annual DC Interfaith Leadership Summit for young adult leaders in the region until 2017. Jack grew up in a religiously mixed family and identifies as a Baha'i who is also culturally Jewish.

Understanding the threat of white Christian nationalism to American democracy today

Findings from the PRRI/Brookings Christian Nationalism Survey

Wednesday, February 8, 2023, 10:00 - 11:30 a.m. ET

The rising influence of white Christian nationalism in some circles of American politics is posing a major threat to the health of our democracy and our culture. A new PRRI/Brookings survey of more than 6,000 Americans takes a closer look at the

underpinnings of white Christian nationalism, providing new measures to estimate the proportion of Americans who adhere to and reject Christian nationalist ideology. The survey also examines how Christian nationalist views intersect with white identity, anti-Black sentiment, patriarchy, antisemitism, anti-Muslim sentiments, anti-immigrant attitudes, authoritarianism, and support for violence. Additionally, the survey explores the influence Christian nationalism has among our two political parties and major religious subgroups today.

On February 8, Governance Studies at Brookings and the Public Religion Research Institute will host the release of this new groundbreaking national survey. A panel of experts will discuss the survey results and what they reveal about Christian nationalism, the state of American democracy, and the health of our society.

The Michigan Department of Civil Rights Releases a Report on Farmworker Housing and Hunger

The report states that farm workers are the backbone of Michigan's agricultural industry, which contributes \$104.7 billion annually to the state economy, despite agricultural work being one of the lowest-paid and most hazardous occupations. The report emphasizes the vulnerability of farmworkers and the challenges they face with housing affordability, access, and conditions, exacerbated during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Overall, the study found that more than a third of farmworkers were classified as living in poverty. Notably, this is more than three times the official poverty rate in

the general United States. Food insecurity emerged as an important issue for farmworkers. Over a quarter of farmworkers were classified as having low or very low food security (27%)—more than double the level of food insecurity in US households (10.5%) in 2020 and almost seven times greater than the 3.9% of US households facing very low food security.

Food security is an important social determinant of health and good nutrition is foundational for overall health and well-being of farmworkers and their families. Food assistance programs for farmworkers and their families may be an important approach to address food security issues in this population.

The report confirms the need for Interfaith Actions migrant food assistance initiative Project: Faith in Action.

An Inspirational Challenge from MLK

In Martin Luther King Jr.'s "Beyond Vietnam" speech, he calls for a revolution of values based on love:

This call for a worldwide fellowship that lifts neighborly concern beyond one's tribe, race, class, and nation is in reality a call for an all-embracing and unconditional love for all [humankind].... When I speak of love I am not speaking of some sentimental and weak response. I'm not speaking of that force which is just emotional bosh. I am speaking of that force which all of the great religions have seen as the supreme

unifying principle of life. Love is somehow the key that unlocks the door which leads to ultimate reality. This Hindu-Muslim-Christian-Jewish-Buddhist belief about ultimate reality is beautifully summed up in the first epistle of Saint John: "Let us love one another, for love is of God.




